30 Day In -School Brushing Brings Excitement and Revolution



Behavior Change is a process that needs commitment, time and resilience to attain. One-off encounters with new knowledge may not be enough to inculcate new habits. After a review of the impact made by one day lessons and brushing demonstration in schools, a need to change approach was birthed.

Children in 56 primary schools were given an opportunity to do In-school brushing, together with their teacher and monitored brushing at home with the help of the parents.

This has brought out excitement and desire to keep it going among the teachers, community and the children. There are notable improvements on their oral health and brushing of the teeth has become a must do activity, three times a day. This calls for more toothbrushes, toothpaste and toothbrush storage kits. At a cost of \$50 you can sponsor in-school brushing for a class of 50 children for 30 days. Our one-off school health program is still going on, reaching 100,000 children this year.
